AFTER MEN WHO HAVE ABANDONED FAMILIES

Children's Home Full of Those Whose Father's Are Failing to Properly Support Their Families.

With the induction yesterday of three children who were in destitute circumstances, the Buncombe county children's home is crowded, and if others have to be carried there the superintendent will vacate her room on the second floor and turn the parlor into her living room. G. F. Stradley, commissioner of public institutions, said yesterday that it is a common occurrence for the home to be taxed during the winter months, and that there appeared to be some agitation favoring increasing the children's home, but that in his opinion the rounding up of fathers who have abandoned their wives and children, would come nearer alleviating the present situation than building a larger children's home. Miss Donnahoe, superintendent of the home, concurs with Mr. Stradley in this, and says that a large number of the children whom are found in serious circumstances and who are brought to the home to be cared for, have a father who is not attempting to support them. The county welfare officer has been instructed to issue warrants for all men who have abandoned their families, and the co-operation of officers in other counties will be sought. Mr. Parker said yesterday that he had several men under surveillance and expected to bring them to justice.

The deceased is the widow of the late P. K. Reece, a former magistrate of Jupiter, and is survived by two brothers and two sisters: Dr. M. C. Roberts of Sandy Mush township, J. W. Roberts of this city, Mrs. Harriet Anderson of Skyland, and Mrs. Emma Smith of the Billmore estate.

The body of Mrs. Margaret Price was taken yesterday afternoon to her former home at Clarksville, Mo. Mrs. Price died at the home of her son here, Rev. T. B. Price, and at the time of her death Rev. Mr. Price was at Fayetteville, where he was conducting revival services. Rev. Mr. Price accompanied the body and it is understood that interment will take place at Clarksville tomorrow afternoon.

PRESENT PHOTOGRAPH OF GOVERNOR VANCE

Life-like Resemblance of the War Governor Will Be Given Veterans of Zeb Vance Camp.

A valuable and beautifully mounted photograph of the late Governor Zebulon Baird Vance, which was taken on the day he was inaugurated governor of North Carolina, will be presented to the veterans of the Zeb Vance camp during the celebration of Lee-Jackson day, which has been arranged by the two local chapters of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and which will be held at the Masonic temple, Monday morning at 11 o'clock. The photograph will be the gift of the Asheville chapter, I. D. C.

The presentation of this photograph, which has been remarkably preserved and which pictures the war governor in a life like resemblance will be a feature of the exercises Monday. It has been announced through a mistake that a hand painted portrait would be presented to the veterans, this has been corrected by members of the Asheville chapter who have had the genuine photograph of the great governor, made on one of the most memorable days in the history of this state, mounted and who will present it to the veterans of the camp which bears the name of the late governor. The Sons of Confederate veterans have been requested to be present for the Lee-Jackson day celebration. R. M. Wells is commandant of the organization and C. M. Brown is adjutant.
