Huntington, who has been state secretary for nearly 16 years placed his resignation in the hands of the committee last summer feeling that with the inauguration of the larger program for the state Y. M. C. A. a younger man should be found to carry the responsibilities of the same.

Second Mass Meeting In Interest of **Proposed** Hotel and Orphanage to Be Held at Y. M. I. January 30,

A permanent organization was formed by the colored citizens of the city at a mass meeting held at the Y. M. L. Friday night for the purpose of perfecting plans for the pro-posed colony, hotel and school to be located near Asheville, and E. W. Pearson was named chairman, and T. G. Hadden, secretary.

The property under consideration which is located on the railroad and also on a paved highway, about 10 miles from this city, was unanimous-ly agreed upon as the logical place for the organization of the proposed colony and the ideal location for an orphanage. In that the project includes a pro

posed orphanage for colored chil-dren, G. F. Stradiey, county commis-sioner of public institutions, accept-ed an invitation to speak at the mass
