FOREIGN BUSINESS INCREASES ON N. Y. COTTON MARKET

Foreign Exchange Situation Has Bearing on Day's Operations.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—The cotton market showed increasing nervousness over the foreign exchange situation today, owing partly to reports that some of the banks have now decided to discontinue discounting dollar drafts against bills of goods and are only taking the bills subject to collection.
