Ordinance stipulating that no anatorium for the treatment of sanatorium for the treatment of every person, firm or corpora-tuberculosis can be operated with-in 125 feet of an adjoining resi-donce or rubite building, was in-troduced before the City Commissioners yesterday and passed on its first reading. Such a measure has been under consideration by the board for more than a year and it is proposed to give oper ators until June 1, 1923 to comply with the provisions of the pro-posed ordinance, which was offered by Mayor Gallatin Roberts. Following is the proposed stat-

ute, which must be passed on its second and third readings before it becomes effective.


