REGULATION OF HOSPITALS TREATING TUBERCULOSIS IS PROPOSED IN NEW ORDINANCE

Ordinance stipulating that no sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis can be operated within 125 feet of an adjoining residence or public building, was introduced before the City Commissioners yesterday and passed on its first reading. Such a measure has been under consideration by the board for more than a year and it is proposed to give operators until June 1, 1923 to comply with the provisions of the proposed ordinance, which was offered by Mayor Callahan, Robert T. Cousins, Jr., and J. T. Cousins.

Following is the proposed statute, which must be passed on its second and third readings before it becomes effective.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Asheville:

Section 1. That no person, firm or corporation shall keep, run, operate or maintain, within the corporate limits of the City of Asheville, North Carolina, any Hospital, Sanitarium, Sanatorium, Boarding House, Lodging House, Rooming House or other place at or in which any person, or persons, suffering from tuberculosis are received, lodged, kept, roomed or boarded, within one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet of any residence, church, school or public building, unless such house or building within one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet thereof is used for a like or similar purpose.

Provided, however, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to a house used solely as a residence, in which a member of the immediate family who is infected or afflicted with tuberculosis, resides, and no other patients suffering with tuberculosis reside.

Provided, further, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply until the first day of June, A. D. 1923, to any Hospital, Sanitarium, Sanatorium, Boarding House, Lodging House or Rooming House operated in the City of Asheville at the time of the passage of this ordinance, but on and after the first day of June, A. D. 1923, the provisions hereof shall apply with full force and effect to any of the aforementioned institutions and establishments operated at the time of the passage of this ordinance.

Section 2. That it shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation operating at the time of the passage of this ordinance, any Hospital, Sanitarium, Sanatorium, Boarding House, Lodging House, Rooming House or other place for the reception, care or treatment of persons suffering, infected or afflicted with tuberculosis within the corporate limits of the City of Asheville, to report to the Health Officer of said City within ten days after the passage hereof, the name and location of any of the foregoing institutions.

Section 3. That any person, firm or corporation desiring or proposing Section 1 hereof, before beginning institutions or places set forth in the operation or construction of any of the said institutions or places shall apply for a permit or license in writing to the Board of Commissioners showing the exact location or place where such institution is to be located, and the location of property, and any other information necessary in passing upon such application by said Board in regard to such institutions, and before the granting of such permit or license the City Engineer shall make a survey of said premises and location sufficient to show whether the place where such institution is to be located complies with the provisions hereof, and it shall be the duty of any licensee holding license hereunder to keep the license posted in a conspicuous place where the same can be seen by the public at all times.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation operating any Hotel, Boarding House or Rooming House not licensed under the provisions hereof to keep, lodge, room or board any person infected or afflicted with tuberculosis within any such Hotel, Boarding House, or Rooming House.

Section 5. That any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall upon conviction be subject to a penalty of fifty (\$50.00) dollars for each and every such offense.

Section 6. That all ordinances or clauses of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

VANDALS DAMAGE LARGE BUS TIRES

Tires, valued at several hundred dollars, the property of the Red Bus Line, Inc., and the Black Mountain Auto Company, Black Mountain, were punctured and cut by unknown parties at Blue Ridge sometime Tuesday night. The tires were on buses of the concern, parked at the assembly grounds in wait for scout officials who desired transportation to the depot at Black Mountain.

Three tires of the Red Bus Line valued at \$165 each, were cut and five or six large tires belonging to the Black Mountain company were damaged. Fortunately, the drivers of the machines had a few spare tires and so some 200 or 300 scout executives were hurried to Black Mountain just in time to catch a special train.

It is understood a reward has been offered for the arrest and conviction of the vandals responsible for the damaging of the tires.

LIBRARY BUILDING IS BEGUN AT OTEEN

Ground has been broken for the erection of a new post library at Oteen Hospital. The building will be a permanent one and will be constructed in a high way near Ward W-3. The reading room will be 60 by 24 feet and a large office and plenty of storage place will be afforded by the new building.

The library will be constructed of material salvaged by the government and will have shelf capacity for 15,000 books, and it is hoped the building will be completed by the first of the year.

Claim Bookkeeper's Error Impaired Credit

Claiming her credit had been impaired because of an error made by the bookkeeper in the employ of Luther M. Hine, operating Smith's Drug Store, Mrs. Nell Godfrey brought suit against the concern yesterday in the Superior Court, asking damages in the amount of \$5,000.

Mrs. Godfrey claims that because of the error her name had been listed with the Merchants' Association and her credit had been impaired.

Gay Green filed suit yesterday against D. M. Sumner, asking damages in the amount of \$200 and the possession of a certain tract of land near Skyland.

Offer of Roberts Is Taken Under Advisement

Only one bid was submitted yesterday to the Board of City Commissioners for the construction of a chute at the new municipal incinerator. This offer was made by R. C. Stevens and the board decided to postpone action on the matter.

W. R. Roberts tendered his resignation as patrolman on the police force, stating he had secured a better position. The resignation was accepted, but no successor was named.

A report from the corporation counsel with reference to the parking of taxicabs equipped with meters on the streets of the city was read to the board yesterday filed.

ROBERT CECIL SAYS FEAR BREEDS WARS

LONDON, Sept. 19.—"When we come to analyze situation closely we find that the fear of war is the beginning of un wisdom," said Lord Robert Cecil recently discussing conditions in Europe. "Russia's apprehensions have been translated into vast armies withdrawn from reproductive work, ill-fed, ill-clothed, ill disciplined, and consequently a greater menace to their friends or fellow-citizens than to their enemies."

"In France the fear of war has led to the establishment of those armies of occupation on the Rhine that are costing bankrupt Germany more than a million pounds a week—more than two thousand million marks."

"Fear of war is leading a section of public opinion in England to demand a vastly increased air service, and still further concentration upon scientific methods of slaughter. In all directions we find that knowledge is still harnessed to destruction; that the readiest means of money-making is to invent something that can destroy life and the products of life-energy faster than nature can replace them. Behind all these manifestations lies fear."
