HICKORY, Sept. 21.—The shopmen who went on strike at the shops here of the Carolina and Northwestern Railroad, a subsidiary of the Southern Railway, have not returned to work. Officials of the company said all but seven of the 115 employees of the strikers were still during the strike. It is understood a representative from the local shop craft is in Washington today to confer with Southern Railway officials regarding the situation here.

Harding Nominates Minister To Albania

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Ulysses Grant Smith of Pennsylvania, until recently American commissioner and charge d'affaires of the American legation in Hungary, was nominated today by President Harding to be minister to the newly recognized government of Albania. He has been in the diplomatic service since 1903, serving successively in Turkey, England, Chile, Belgium, Austria-Hungary, Denmark and Hungary.
