### SALESMAN'S COURSE AT LEICESTER HIGH

High School Students Divided Into Rival Teams—Proceeds to Buy Athletic Equipment.

Students of Leicester High School have launched a course in salesmanship, provided by the Curtis Publishing Company. The course has been conducted in more than 6,000 schools and has been endorsed by some of the leading educators of the country. Orla T.
