NAME JUDGES FOR COMMUNITY FAIRS

EXTENSION 2 DIVISION 2 MEN ARE SECURED. Annual Community Fairs Begin Next Tuesday With One at Avery's Creek—Three Others.

Frank Clark, youthful pro at the Asheville Country Club, with Victor East, Biltmore Forest pro and Jimmie Grace, his assistant, are in Nashville, struggling along with the other shining lights over the Belle Mead Country Club course there.

Coming close upon the heels of the winners were Kirkwood, of Asheville, who had as his partner, Pollock, the crack amateur of Chattanooga, the pair having a best score of 67. They were tied for second place with Leo Diegel, of New Orleans and Norman Craig of Nashville.

George Duncan, the heavy waller from England, negotiated the course for us by adding his best ball with that of Grantland Rice, of New York. Two other pairs had the same figures, George Livingstone, Belle Mead, with Mike Thomas, Nashville and Eddie Loon, Chicago, with Goodloe Lindsey, Nashville. Seven pairs finished with 70 including Abe Mitchell of England and Frank Godchaux.

George Evans, sheep expert with the State Extension Division, has been secured to judge livestock in the four community fairs to be held here next week, and some expert from the State Department of Agronomy will be expected to judge field and garden crop exhibits, C. R. Miller, County Farm Agent, said yesterday.

Provision at the four fairs has been made for more than 2,000 entries, and officials are confident available space will be filled to capacity by exhibitors.

The fairs begin Tuesday, October 3, with the one at Avery's Creek, after which Fairview comes Thursday, Swannanoa Friday, and Candler Saturday.

Sacred Memory of Lee Recalled Here to Be Perpetuated in Bronze

As orator after orator during the Asheville reunion of Confederate Veterans has referred to General Robert E. Lee as the greatest man the South has ever produced, it has made timely consideration of the movement launched in the Mountain Metropolis to place along the Lee and Dixie Highways bronze memorial tablets depicting the great General mounted on his favorite horse, "Traveler."

There are now on hand 100 facsimiles of the proposed tablet and these, it is announced, are ready for distribution to the U. D. C. chapters throughout the State. Mrs. James M. Cudger, Jr., who served as vice-chairman of the Reunion Committee, is representative for North Carolina in the movement to place these memorial tablets.

The proposition first was brought up by Mrs. Uriah Seeley, a member of the Asheville Chapter, which endorsed the proposed plan. Later the movement grew as other chapters took it up and pairs of the State convention of U. D. C. endorsed the plan last October at Winston-Salem.

Tablets of bronze are to measure 14x23 inches, and will be placed at the intersection of each State on the Lee Highway. The North Carolina daughters hope to raise \$500 to pay for a die from which the tablets are to be cast. Other States will pay \$115 each for the tablets to be used upon the Lee Highway. Efforts are now being put forth by the Asheville Daughters to swell the fund needed in this movement.
