Fireproof Warehouse Planned By Westall

Immediate start upon the construction of a fireproof office and warehouse is to be made by J. M. Westall and Company, dealing in humber and builders supplies, at Walnut Street and Lexington Ave-

The proposed building, to be of steel, hollow tile and with stucco steel, hollow life and with stucco exterior, will face upon Walnut Street for 50 feet and upon Lex-ington for 80 feet, being so con-structed as to be two stories in height and capable of having an additional two stories when this increase is desired.

The proposed building will cost over \$15,000, it is estimated, and will double the storage capacity of the firm in its uptown yard. 
