Mrs. Mary C. Whiteside, 78 widow of the late John B. Whiteside, died at the home, 24 Tacoma Street, Saturday evening. Funeral services will be conducted from the residence at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. Rev. Dr. R. J. Huteman, Pastor of the First Baptist Church officiating.

Mrs. Whiteside was born near Greenville, S. C. in 1844. The family moved to Hendersonville when she was 10 years of age, and later to Wooten, this county, where at the age of 17 she was married to John B. Whiteside.

Surviving are five children: Mrs. L. W. Bridgewater of Slouss City, Iowa; Mrs. C. J. Hooker of Asheville; J. K. Whiteside of Candler; J. E. and D. B. Whiteside of Asheville, and a brother, John Cochran of Asheville.

"MARY" AT AUDITORIUM TONIGHT

The story of the play has to do with a young man with inventive turn in mind who in an effort to make secure the financial standing of his mother who is a leader in the social world, hits upon the happy idea of a portable house, the selling point of which is the sure elimination of the prevailing evil, the high cost of living. The well-laid plans of our energetic young hero comes to grief but accidentally he becomes a millionaire over night through the discovery of oil on the land where he had erected quite a number of his portable houses. Of course the inevitable happens, our newly rich young man returns from the West and marries the girl of his dreams, Mary.

The costumes are a rare treat to the eye and the scenic embellishments all that could be desired. The ensemble is a masterpiece of scenic artistry ever seen in musical comedy and reflect the genius of the past-master of this art, Julian Mitchell.

AT THE IMPERIAL
Nero, in all his glory and his greatness, now at the Imperial for three days. William Fox, having made up his mind to let the motion picture public know just what the last of the caesars and his disolute court looked like, sent J. Gordon Edwards over to Rome to stage a picture atmosphere and the correct types of characters might be secured. The result of this famous director's labors, combined with the efforts of a fine cast and also those of the largest and most energetic mob ever put to work in a film, is now being shown to the public under the short and direct title, "Nero."

"Nero" is an amazing picture. The claim that it is a super-special is fully substantiated. In fact, everything about it is super-sets, acting, photography, sensations and plot. Headed by Jacques Grellat in the title role, it contains a fine Alexander Salvini as Horatius, Paullette Duva las Poppaea, Eddy Darcia as Acta and Violet Mercereau as Marcia, a list of actors representative of France, Italy and the United States.

Taxable Returns Of Corporations Showing Decrease

Almost Two Million More Individuals Showing Up in Returns.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Taxable returns of corporations fell off by \$1,500,000,000 during 1920, according to complete internal revenue statistics made public tonight by Commissioner Blair. A total net income of \$7,902,000,000 was reported by 202,233 corporations, against which income taxes of \$633,700,000 and war profits and excess profits taxes of \$988,700,000 were levied as compared with a total net income of \$9,411,000,000 reported in 1919 by 209,534 corporations against which a total tax of \$2,175,000,000 was levied.

There were returns by 160 corporations in 1920 which reported net income of \$5,000,000 and over; 836 reported from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000 and 1,142 from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

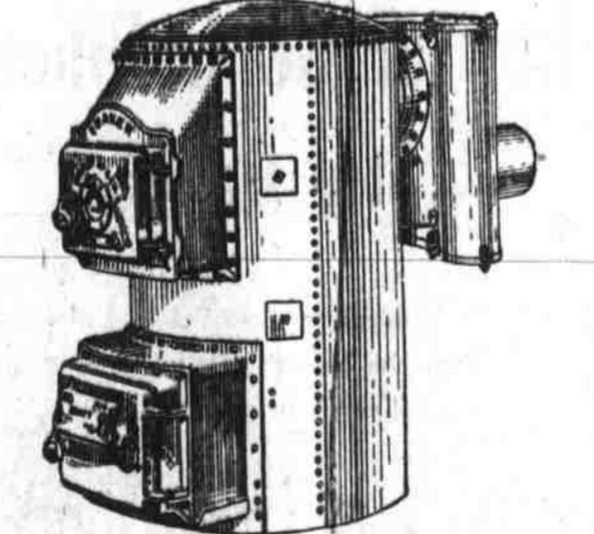
The number of individuals who filed income tax returns for the calendar year 1920 was 7,285,944 with an aggregate net income of \$23,735,000,000 and a total tax of \$1,075,000,000, which as compared with 1919, showed a growth of 1,927 in the number of returns filed and an increase in the total net income reported of \$3,876,000,000 but a decrease of \$194,500,000 in the total tax.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Oct. 1.—The Right Rev. William A. Guerry, who will be bishop of the newly created Episcopal diocese of Lower South Carolina, has called a meeting of the diocesan council for October 17 to complete organization of the diocese. Bishop Kirkman G. Finley of Columbia, will be bishop of the Upper Diocese. The division of South Carolina in two dioceses was approved at the recent general convention at Portland, Oregon.
