WADDELL SPEAKS TO CENTRAL UNION

Body Takes Under Advisement Resolution Regarding Increasing of City's Water Supply.

Charles E. Waddell, consulting engineer, who recently made a survey of the city watershed for the City of Asheville, spoke at the meeting of the Central Labor Union last evening. Mr. Waddell advised it would not be plausible at the present time to construct an entirely new system and main from the Pisgah Forest Reserve but that at the municipal sheds there is still plenty of water and that an impounding lake would solve the problem.

It was previously understood it was the opinion of the members that the main should be built from the government reservation. The matter was taken under advisement after the address of Mr. Waddell and will be further considered before resolutions are passed.

Mr. Waddell said that the main to the Pisgah sheds would cost about \$3,700,000 and the city would be required to pay \$3,000 per year for the use there. To build the impounding lake would

CIVIC LEAGUERS VOICE COMPLAINT

Plan to Have Vacant Lots of City Cleaned up—Appear Before City Commissioners Tuesday.

A thorough cleaning of the vacant lots in Asheville and plans for the disposal of unsightly debris is planned by members of the Civic League. Over a score of representatives from the league appeared before the Board of City Commissioners yesterday and voiced protest against the conditions of lots near the business district. They suggested the need of a law requiring owners to keep same cleaned up, and they were also of the opinion that an ordinance should be passed prohibiting any person or persons, from expectorating on the streets of Asheville. This was referred to the corporation counsel.

Commissioner of Public Works R. J. Sherrill suggested that the ladies co-operate with the City Health department and said he would order the municipal trash wagons to remove all trash free of charge for one week, provided the debris is gathered up. The ladies are to specify the time.

'GYM' EQUIPMENT FOR Y.M.C.A. TO BE BOUGHT

Decision Is Reached at Monthly Meeting of Board of Directors of Organization Tuesday.

Decision to purchase equipment of the physical department as well for the gymnasium and other parts as furnishing for the new dormitories for the local Young Men's Christian Association, was reached last night at the regular monthly business meeting of the directors. It was learned that the contractors think materials are coming sufficiently fast now to get the building in readiness about the first of December. In order that all departments might be ready to function at once after completion of the work the different committees in charge were authorized to place orders at once. The work has been greatly handicapped on account of delays in receipt of materials, but each day is bringing some parts.
