RATE HEARING IN CITY NOW COMPLETED

Witnesses, Attorneys and Members Interstate Commerce Commission Leaving Asheville.

Adjournment of the hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission sitting at the Battery Park Hotel was reached yesterday noon upon the conclusion of testimony by Charles E. Bell, traffic expert of the Virginia Shippers' Association, who opposed a uniform mileage rate as proposed by the carriers and advocated zones and groupings. The commission interests that bind Virginia and the Carolinas in rate making were stressed by the expert, who requested the stand a day and a half, introducing voluminous exhibits tending to show that traffic in the Virginia-Carolina territory is heavier than other states of the Southeast.

Members of the Commission will meet again in New Orleans on October 30. All had left Asheville by Friday evening except A. J. Wagner and R. Hudson Burr, who plan to leave today.

Attorneys for the carriers did not cross-examine Mr. Bell upon the conclusion of his testimony yesterday, announcing that they would do this at the hearing scheduled in New York City on December 4.

A. J. Maxwell, of the North Carolina Corporation Commission, made it clear upon the termination of the sitting yesterday that practically all the testimony brought forward at the hearing upheld the contention of the Corporation Commission that traffic in the Carolinas and Virginia is seeking lower rate levels from the carriers.

TO RECEIVE BIDS ON FAIRVIEW ROAD

This project was to have been let in September, but the lowest bid received was around \$300,000, which the State Commission considered too high.

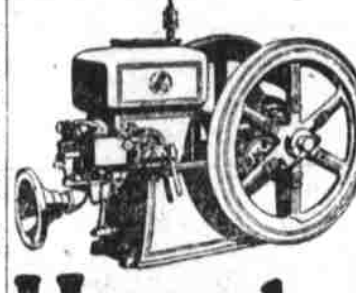
