**ASK IMPROVEMENTS AT ASHLAND SCHOOL**

One room is not being heated properly, it was said. The committee will be investigated by the members of the City School Board.

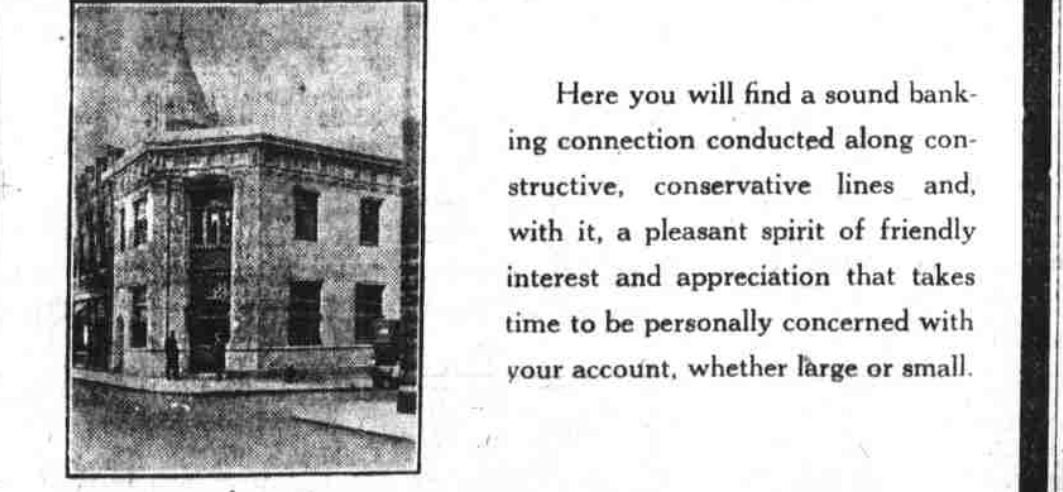
