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NOTED ENGINEER TO VISIT WATERSHEDS

JOHN R. FREEMAN TO ARRIVE THIS AFTERNOON

Expected to Spend Several Days in Asheville Making Study of Water Situation.

John R. Freeman, noted engineer, who will arrive in Asheville early this afternoon for the purpose of making an investigation of the water supply situation for the city of Asheville, will inspect the two watersheds this afternoon, in company with R. J. Sherrill, Commissioner of Public Works, and Charles E. Waddell, Consulting Engineer.

Mr. Freeman is expected to spend at least three or four days in Asheville making a careful study of the situation, after which he will probably take a week to prepare his report, giving the City Commissioners his opinion of the situation within about ten days.
