

BARACA-PHILATHEA ENJOY GOOD YEAR

Many Activities Shown in Comprehensive Report by Mrs. N. Buckner, Secretary.

Summary of varied and interesting activities carried out by the Baraca-Philathea Union of North Carolina during the 1921-22 season has been prepared in booklet form by Mrs. N. Buckner, General Secretary, who gives in addition an inspiring message for the coming year, setting a number of important objectives toward which the union is urged to strive.

These messages points out should be "organization of new classes, increasing interest, efficiency and members, organizing County and City Unions, Senior Baraca and Philathea classes to organize Junior classes and foster them; every class to have an active Secret Service committee definitely working to save souls; a national charter with dues paid, enlisting all of our young people on greater personal service, more attention given to instruction in classes and the public in Baraca-Philathea motto, principles, aims and objects; pray more for the work and give more of our time, talents, influence and money; let us be more aggressive in Christian service and go up and possess the land, for we are well able. My message, summed up in the few lines where need Christ as never before. No problems are going to be solved without Him. Make Him and what He offers your own; then give Him and what He offers to others."

Some indication of the steady increase of activities in the Union during the past five years is shown in a tabulation prepared by the Secretary. Under the heading "money received and disbursed" it shows a growth from \$2,197.83 for 1917-1918 to \$7,564.16 in 1921-22, or more than double the first amount. With only 13,516 letters mailed in the first year mentioned the number has grown to 39,142 in the year just closed.

A total of 20,925 "Pollyanna" capsules were distributed, the report shows, and in regard to this the Secretary writes: "Our Pollyanna Glad Game has enabled us to reach the patients daily and through this game cooperation has been secured from every State in the Union. We can see the enlivening effect this work has had upon a great many of our classes, and we only wish that other classes in the State could catch the vision of the golden opportunity that this work in the sanatoriums and hospitals at Asheville has given us."

"Every possible means has been used to keep Baraca-Philathea principles, plans, motto, aims, methods before our classes, to win new workers and create more interest in Sunday School work. "A total of 15,723 miles have been travelled in North Carolina in the interest of the work. Much publicity of Baraca and Philathea work and its accomplishments has been given by the newspapers of this State and other publications. We would take this opportunity to express appreciation and thanks for the generous co-operation given by the press. We believe the use of these stories of immensely human interest is one of our greatest channels for arousing and maintaining interest in Baraca and Philathea, and we grasp every opportunity to secure the use of such news stories as have a definite interest to readers, and a still more definite interest to the Sunday School and the church. We have a good thing and we want to tell others and share it."

Election Law Is Cited By Democrats

The Democratic Executive Committee yesterday issued a statement to members of the party to the effect that if they know of any Democrat that is sick or will be absent from the county on November 7 to communicate with the local headquarters at once. The leaders cited the following statute: "In all primaries and elections of every kind hereafter held in this State, any elector who may be absent from the county in which he is entitled to vote, or physically unable to attend for the purpose of voting in person, which fact shall be made to appear by the certificate of a physician or by affidavit, shall be allowed to register and vote."

'Forget-Me-Not Day' In Asheville Will Be For Nearby Hospitals

With practically every detail arranged for the campaign to be carried out "Forget-Me-Not Day" for the disabled veterans at the Green and Kenilworth Public Health Hospitals, officials of the War Mothers who have been very active in preparation for the sale of the small tokens upon the city streets will bring generous returns.

Volunteer workers, selected by the War Mothers, have arranged to cover all portions of the congested district Saturday, commencing at 10 o'clock in the morning and continuing until 5 p. m. If there still remain some of the tokens unsold, however, it is planned to resume the canvass during the late evening hours. At present there are 6,000 Forget-Me-Not tokens on hand to be disposed of to the public, although the original number was 4,000.

Each canvasser will carry a box of the new imitation flowers and a mime box so arranged that the contributions may be placed therein by the person making a contribution. These have all been prepared and are in readiness for Saturday.

At the close of the day, the tokens, unopened, will be turned over to T. C. Harrell, who is Cashier at Oteen, for the Billmore-Oteen Bank, which has volunteered to act as treasurer of the fund.

Disposition of the funds collected will be made under the supervision of the Disabled American Veterans' organization, the Oteen chapter of which has 250 members and also includes a number to Kenilworth patients as well.

It is pointed out that there are numerous things required by the disabled veterans in the nearby hospitals which are not furnished by the Government and which, in many cases, must be foregone by the patients who lack extra funds to purchase them.

ESTIMATE BUILDING FOR WEEK AT \$25,400

Report of Activities to Be Filed With Board of City Commissioners at Today's Session.

Building permits amounting to \$25,400 have been issued by the Board of City Commissioners during the past week. The permits call for the erection of seven new houses in addition to repair and alterations.

Permits issued yesterday were as follows: Grover Ledbetter, store, Broadway, \$2,000; P. S. Spruice, 235 Ashland Avenue, residence, \$2,500.

Commissioner R. L. Fitzpatrick was authorized by the board yesterday to draft an ordinance calling for the extension of the fire limits on Broadway to Howard Street, a distance of about 150 feet.

Capt. P. H. Shuford, of the new veterinary national guard unit, appeared before the board and asked for further financial assistance by the board for the securing of large quarters to be used as an armory. At present the city donates \$25 per year toward the guard and the request will be further considered and investigated by the commissioner of public safety before the board takes action.

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
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
