Intense Activity Among Educational Forces of State for Negro.

RALEIGH, Nov. 2 — North Carolina is spending this year on negro education approximately \$2.000.

1000, according to an article prepared by Prof. H. C. Newbold, Director of the Division of Negro pared by Frof. H. C. Newsold, Di-rector of the Division of Negro-Education of the Department of Public Instruction, which will be presented to the North Carolina Conference on Negro Education opening here tomorrow. A million and a half dollars annually goes for salaries of colored teachers. Mr. Newbold's article indicates

intense activity among the educa-tional forces of the State in the development of educational opporunities for the colored man.

tunities for the colored man.

"We are spending about \$600,000 on the three state normal schools," writes Mr. Newbold. "Several buildings are being constructed at each place. These will practically be completed and furnished by the first of January, 1923. The State furnished \$500,000 or the money, \$125,000 for couldness contrib-\$125,000 for equipment contrib-

uted by General Education Board.)
"To this date we have aided in building more than 283 Rosen-wald achools in the rural districts. wald schools in the rural districts. The total cost of these buildings is around \$750,000. About \$250,000 of this i, being spent this year for new and better school buildings in the country. (\$175,000 by colored people, \$175,000 by Rosenwald fund in total given.)

"There are now 24 county training schools. Last year there were 20. Most of the money to support these schools comes from the pub-It took slightly \$100,000 last year to pay the ex-penses of the 20 schools. The 24 thi year will receive around \$125,-000. That means for teachers' aslaries and current expenses. These schools are aided by the Slater fund and the General Edu-

"We had Jeanes teachers last year in 40 counties. More than two-thirds of the salaries of these teachers, amounting to about \$35,-000, was paid from public tax money by State and County funds. (Part of these salaries were paid from the Jeanes fund.)

"We are now co-operating with ne private schools in the matter of teacher training. At each of these schools the State pays the salary of the director of teacher training. The work done in these schools is correlated with that in the State Department of Public Instruction to the end that pupils who complete the courses planned receive State certificates.
