POSTAL SERVICE TO ISSUE NEW STAMPS

COMMEMORATE HISTORICAL LINE TO PRESENT DATE

New Five-Cent Stamp to Bear Likeness of Roosevelt—Hayes on 11-Cent Stamp.

Several varieties of new postage stamps have been issued by the United States Postal Service although none of the new issues have been received in Asheville, according to Dan W. Hill, Postmaster, and will not be received in all probability until the present supply is exhausted.

However, several of the clerks have noted a new issue of special delivery stamps on several letters passing through.

The new five-cent stamp will bear the likeness of former President Theodore Roosevelt, but will not be placed on sale until the present supply is exhausted.

A new 11-cent postage stamp, peacock blue, with a likeness of Rutherford B. Hayes, will be placed on sale generally during the next 30 days.

A new 50-cent stamp, bearing a picture of the Arlington Amphitheatre and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, will be placed on sale early in November, probably on Armistice Day, November 11.

The portraits and designs for the series include Washington and Jefferson as fathers of our institutions; Franklin as the first Postmaster General; Martha Washington to commemorate the pioneer womanhood of America; Lincoln,

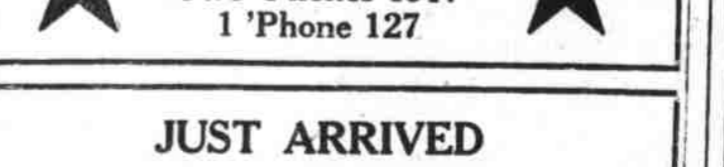
