SOUTHERN IMPROVES PASSENGER SERVICE

Changes in Trains Between Washington and Atlanta to Be Felt in Carolina Points.

Effective Sunday, November 5, the Southern Railway System will make important additions and improvements in its service between Washington and Atlanta.

Trains Numbers 135 and 44 will be extended and operated as through trains, handling coaches and sleeping cars, between Washington and Atlanta, on the following schedules: No. 135: Leave Washington, 8:20 a. m.; leave Salisbury, 8:55 p. m.; leave Charlotte, 10:15 p. m. and arrive Atlanta, 6:25 a. m.

No. 44: Leave Atlanta, 9:00 p. m.; arrive Charlotte, 4:25 a. m.; arrive Greensboro, 7:40 a. m.; arrive Danville, 9:25 a. m. and arrive Washington, 7:05 p. m.

The running time of Number 35 will be reduced two hours, leaving Washington 11:00 a. m., Salisbury 9:50 p. m., Charlotte 11:00 p. m. and arriving Atlanta 6:40 a. m.

Number 35 will be an exclusive passenger train and will handle sleeping cars from New York to New Orleans, Birmingham and Columbia, Ga., and from Charlotte, Greenville and Asheville to Atlanta.

These changes will give greatly improved service between Atlanta and the territory between Charlotte and Lynchburg and other Carolina points such as Winston-Salem, Durham and Raleigh.

Running time of Number 38, the New York and New Orleans Limited, will also be reduced so as to put it out of Atlanta at 12:25 p. m. and into Washington at 7:00 a. m. and New York 12:30 p. m.

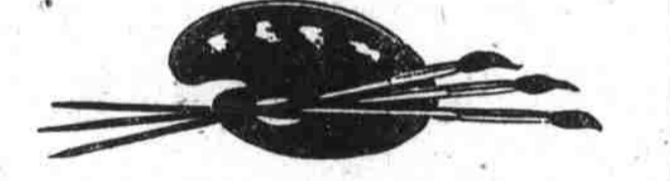
