**ELECT MRS. TILLET, OF CHARLOTTE, AS REGENT TO HEAD D. A. R. IN STATE HIGH POINT, Nov. 2.**—With the election of Mrs. W. T. Tillet, of Charlotte, as regent, the acceptance of the old "Constitution House" in Halifax County as a state shrine and the adoption of the American Revolution as the theme of the 23rd annual state conference of the Daughters of the American Revolution ended its sessions here today.

Other officers elected include Mrs. R. L. Mauney, of Salisbury, vice-regent; Mrs. E. L. Kessler, of Charlotte, corresponding secretary; and Miss Bonnie Mauney, of Kings Mountain, treasurer.

The purchase of the historic edifice in Halifax County was made possible by efforts of various D. A. R. chapters throughout the State and the public subscription. The house, in which the constitution of North Carolina was drawn up and which has been restored so far as possible to the condition in which it was presented to the convention by Mrs. Walter Woodruff, who represented the "Constitution House" Committee.

Among the important resolutions adopted was one which authorized the appointment of a committee to ask the State Legislature to provide an appropriation for the establishment of a memorial to North Carolina soldiers of the Revolutionary War. The resolution suggested that the memorial be in the form of a bay for the memorial church at Valley Forge.

Another resolution provided that the organization accept the site of the John Paul Jones house in Halifax County which was offered by Mrs. Edwin Gregory, representative of the John Paul Jones Association.

Other important resolutions provided for annual contributions of ten per cent for Americanization work on Hills Island, and endorsement of the work of the Dr. Mary Martin School at Grossmont, and the Southern Industrial Institute.

Following adjournment, the delegates were taken to Greensboro where they witnessed the unveiling of a tablet to Alexander Martin, Revolutionary War hero.
