NEW QUARTERS ARE SECURED FOR CLINIC

Two Large Rooms Prepared, Specifics for Purpose—Nurses Have Record Month.

New and larger quarters for the baby clinic which has been conducted in Asheville for many weeks past, have been completed at 160 Biltmore Avenue, where two large rooms have been converted by paint and sanitary installation into well equipped clinics at laboratory.

So popular has the clinic become, as shown by the records for October just completed, giving a total of 104 babies treated and examined, that this additional room was essential, according to officials of the Asheville Public Health Nursing Association, who have charge of the clinic at which local physicians officiate.

In the preparation of the new quarters, paint and paper was furnished by the City, while the plumbing was contributed by an interested friend. The Associated Charities, owning the building in which the clinic is held, are giving the space without charging rental.

Not only has the past month proved a record one for the number of infants treated, but has also reached the high water mark for the Public Health Nursing Association, owing to the prevalence of much sickness.

A new automobile is to be secured in the near future for the Supervisor, Mrs. I. C. Hanna, to enable the Association nurses to conduct their work more expeditiously.

NEW COMBINATION FIRE TRUCK HELD

A new American La France combination truck was yesterday afternoon rolled into the central station of the Asheville Fire Department, giving the department, with the other machines on hand, a combined pumping capacity of 2,250 gallons a minute or if pumped from hydrants, 7,500 gallons per minute, according to the estimate of Chief A. L. Truckett.

The truck, to be known as No. 2, and secured by the Department of Public Safety at a cost of \$12,000, is the latest word in fire fighting equipment of that type, and has a number of improvements over the recently purchased trucks of similar manufacture. It carries ladders, 1,200 feet of hose and has a pumping capacity of 750 gallons per minute, and also carries a 40-gallon chemical tank.

Tryouts to determine the thorough tuning of the big machine are to be made at once during the presence of a representative of the company from which it was purchased. It was shipped in running order in a front end automobile freight car.

MAKE GOVERNMENT STREET TWO-WAY

In order to expedite the construction of the new home for the Ben March on Howard Street, opposite the Asheville Citizen Building, R. L. Fitzpatrick, Commissioner of Public Safety, has designated Government Street as a two-way thoroughfare, so that the dump wagons carrying dirt are permitted to traverse the nearer route coming and going. This was done also to keep the added traffic and litter off of Patton Avenue.
