MUCH INTEREST IS SHOWN IN THE COMING REINFORCEMENT CAMPAIGN IN BUNCOMBE COUNTY

The seventh Baptist Conference held Sunday in various sections of the county in the interest of the coming Reinforcement Campaign, drew well attended and a deep interest in the drive was manifested. The following facts were emphasized by the speakers of the local Sunday School Association of the denomination: "First, the object of the Reinforcement Campaign is to carry it out; Second, The Gospel of Healing and Ministering to the Aged and Helpless; Third, God's Command to Preach the Gospel and to Teach; Fourth, God's Answer to the Southern Baptists' Foreign Mission Program During the Last Three Years. Aside from the carrying out of this program, at these seven institutes, in the afternoon, speakers went to nearly all the 79 Baptist churches in the county, and made a talk on the same line of subjects that were discussed in the afternoon conference and urged the attendance from all these churches in the afternoon. While it is a fact that some few Baptists are now and then a church swings out of line, and does not warm up to the importance and necessity of this work, yet, generally speaking, a very enthusiastic interest has been shown from present indications, the campaign is progressing in a very satisfactory manner, the leaders say."
