VALUE OF LIVE AND DEAD TREES SHOWN

Forest Service Points Out Fact That Lumber Have Timber Use as Good as Live Trees.

Time was when dwellers in the land of the Sky thought little of burning black walnut for backlogs. While the rising price of lumber has long since brought an end to such extravagance, in some quarters there still exists a prejudice against the use of lumber cut from dead trees.

As a matter of fact, according to information gained from the U. S. Forest Service here, when sound dead trees are saved into lumber and the weathered or charred outside is cut away, there is no method known to the Forest Products Laboratory by which the lumber can be distinguished from that cut from the live trees, except that the lumber from dead trees may be just as strong and just as durable as sound live tree wood, the laboratory asserts.

All the information available at the laboratory indicates that timber cut from insect or fire killed trees is just as good for any structural purpose as that cut from live trees of similar quality, provided that the wood has not been subsequently injured by decay or further insect attack.

If a tree stands on the stump too long after it is killed, the sapwood is likely to become decayed or badly infected by wood-boring insects and in time the heartwood also will be similarly infected, officials of the Forest Service point out.

The same thing is true of logs cut from live trees and not properly cared for. Until the wood becomes affected by these destructive agents, dead tree wood should be just as strong and just as durable as sound live tree wood, the laboratory asserts.

Grain Being Hard Hit by Weevil in Western Section

Devastating inroads upon the corn crop of Western Carolina are threatened, according to R. W. Gray, County Agent of Jackson, who visited in Asheville recently seeking the proper chemical with which to exterminate the pest which weevil now attacking field products with great vigor.

The weevil, according to the agent, grows in the form of a small worm hatched within the kernel, so that it completely removes the heart of each grain before boring through the hard shell and becoming liberated in the form of a moth.

Buncombe County farmers have not been without the pest, which, while attacking corn as a choice, also selects other cereal crops to damage.

A method of fumigation within a closed bin or crib has been found to kill the weevil before it has spoiled the grain.

BUNCOMBE AGAIN FOR PREVENTION

County Commissioners Appropriate \$1,000 for Year's Protection of Forests.

Realizing the value of protection from forest fires, the Board of Commissioners of Buncombe County yesterday decided to renew for another year the appropriation of \$1,000 made last year for this purpose. This sum is duplicated by the State, so if it is required, \$2,000 is available for the protection and fire fighting in Buncombe County during the year. Last year, according to the records of the District Warden's office, it required but \$600 all told, so that the remainder will be applied upon the work of the new year.

While all reports from the district covering the month of October have not yet been received, those in the hands of C. H. Burge, District Warden for the N. C. Geological and Economic Survey, show that more than 30 fires were handled within that period. The estimated damage runs over \$10,000, there being between 1,000 and 6,000 acres burned over in Western North Carolina.

A small brush and forest fire beyond Grace was reported to the District Warden late yesterday and while the blaze created much smoke over North Asheville, the damage reported was not great.
