The bride is a graduate of the Graham School of New York and the Danvers School of Art, New York.

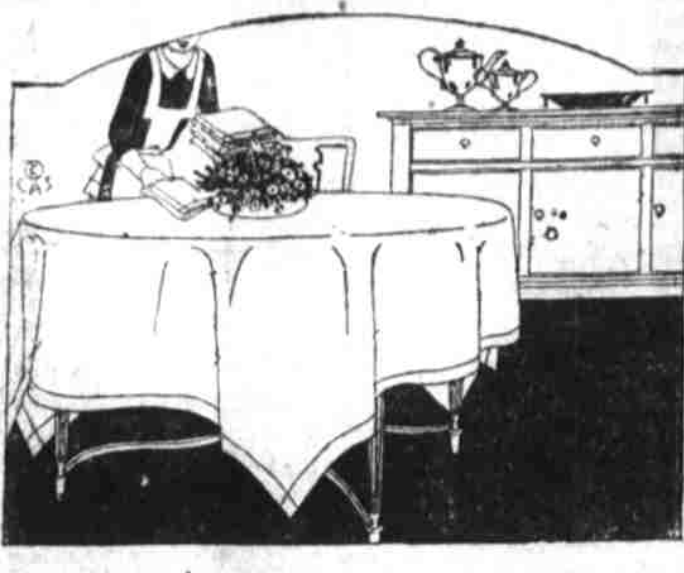
Mr. Marshall is a graduate of Princeton University, class of 1916, and is a member of the New York firm of George S. Burr and Company, bankers.
