The Norfolk & Southern Road reports for January gross earnings of \$354,265, a decrease of \$1,036; and net, \$13,796; an increase of \$5,131. For seven months to January 31st, gross \$238,749, an increase of \$155, and net \$83,436, an increase of \$1,134.

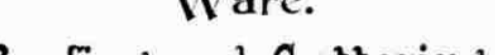
