The following resolution was passed: "RESOLVED, That during the two years term of office of the present board of councilmen nothing shall pass said board unless there are three votes in favor of its passage, of which three the Mayor's vote may be one.

A. L. White was given until next meeting to file his bond.  
Contract for lighting town was also continued till next meeting.  
W. B. Shepard and Robert Blount are appointed street committee, J. A. Woodard and Isaac Blount committee on finance.  
Ordered, that the street committee be authorized to look after the condition of the streets and buy oyster shells to be put where needed.  
Adjourned.
