PLAY TWO GAMES OF BALL.

Franklin's "soft snap" proved not so "soft" after all. SENT HOME SICK.

On Tuesday last the prettiest, closest and most exciting game of base ball ever played in Edenton was witnessed by a large and enthusiastic crowd of people at the Fair grounds. The game was called promptly at 4 p. m. by Umpire Jno. C. Bond, the home team at the bat. The first inning gave Edenton two runs, Franklin one. In the second, third and fourth both sides were shut out, but on reaching the fifth the Edenton's appeared to get mad with the ball and tried to knock its cover off, making five runs. Same inning Franklin scored two. Sixth, Edenton 1, Franklin 4. In this inning one run scored for Franklin that it is claimed they were not entitled to, as the third man was retired between bases before runner reached home. The Umpire having a close watch upon the runner caught between 1st and 2nd bases, was unable to see both plays at one and the same time, gave the doubt in favor of the Franklins and ordered score. Seventh inning resulted in another "shut out" for both sides. Eighth, Edenton scored 2, Franklin 3. Ninth another "shut out," making a tie. Tenth, both clubs made one run each, making game still a tie. Eleventh inning ended the game, Edenton being "shut out" and Franklin gaining one run.

SECOND GAME: Wednesday afternoon these clubs again crossed bats. A good crowd was present and never before have we seen such an interest manifested over a game of ball. Edenton went to the bat with the "celebrated" "invincible" Mills in the box, scored two runs. Franklin in their turn were "shut out." Edenton again at the bat in the second inning made two runs, and Franklin again shut out.

During the third inning "time" was called on account of rain, after which Edenton returned to the bat with a determination to win. They batted the ball with a vim, and twice three runs were scored on one hit, while the batter made third base with ease, proving Daniel and Hogan "heavy hitters." Hawkins' two bagger showed he was not far behind. Nine runs scored in this inning for Edenton, while the Franklins were again white-washed. In the fourth inning Edenton having made five runs with only two out, Franklin "threw up the sponge." Umpire called game and declared result, 9 to 0, in favor of Edenton. Below is actual score:
