The association was compelled to suspend all business while the "Tarheels" marched in and sang, and General Gordon gave a neat turn to the interruption by saying: "North Carolina is entitled to interrupt any convention at any time, for she was not only among the foremost in the late war, but first in the revolution. A year before Jefferson penned his immortal Declaration of Independence, North Carolina adopted the Mecklenburg Declaration. So I suppose three cheers for the Old North State." These were given with a will, and then General Gordon said, "And now let North Carolina take her seat, and be quiet."

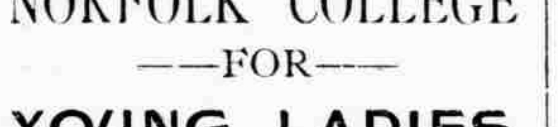
