Fishing and Farming.

We copy the following from Col. F. A. Olds' correspondence: "Two interesting chapters in the forthcoming annual report of the Bureau of Labor Statistics are those on the trucking and fishing interests. The figures are of value. As to truck growing, it is nearly as early here as night or more earlier than Norfolk. On May 3 of last year, over one railway, 500,000 quart, of strawberries were shipped. mated that last year's truck and berry crop was worth \$8,000,000. Craven is the first county as to trucking. The value of the huckleberry crop in Sampson and Duplin is worth as much as \$250,000 in one favorable season. As to the fishing industry, it may be remarked that few States have so large a popula tion dependent upon it for a living. There are 12,000 persons employed in the fisheries, and 3,800 vessels and boats are used.
