The State convention will have no business except to ratify the nominations of the judges, as made by the several judicial districts; selecting a State executive committee to conduct the campaign to a successful issue; and the adoption of a platform upon which the campaign will be waged.

It will be necessary to hold the judicial conventions before the State convention meets. The times for candidates for Congress and Solicitor and the county offices will be determined for each district and county for itself. The Asheville Democracy seems to favor an early congressional convention. As a rule, the counties have not found it wise to name county tickets before September.—News and Observer.
