THE RESULT IN THE STATES.

New York, November 9.—The latest returns are that Roosevelt carries the State by sixteen thousand.

The Legislature is Republican in both branches, and will elect a Republican to succeed Murphy in the Senate.

Croker says he hasn't given up hopes. He still pins his faith to late returns. Chauncey Depew and General Steward Woodford are spoken of as leading Senatorial candidates.

Boston, Mass., November 9.—Wolcott's plurality is 80,000.

Providence, R. I., November 9.—The Republican Congressmen are elected.

New Haven, Conn., November 9.—The State officers, Legislature and Congressmen are Republican.

Philadelphia, November 9.—Davenport will probably go to Congress to succeed a Republican in the Twelfth District. The other districts are unchanged.

Wilmington, Del., November 9.—The Delaware Legislature is Republican and will elect a Republican to succeed Senator Gray. The Republicans elected the Congressmen and State officers.

Columbus, O., November 9.—The Republican plurality is 60,000, more than double that given for Bushnell. As the Republicans have historically lost in "off years," McKinley is the first President to get the endorsement of his administration by his State in an "off year." The Republicans returned as many Congressmen as in the Presidential year.

Carson, November 9.—The Republican Governor is elected by a small majority.

Denver, Col., November 9.—The fusion Democrat Populist-Silver Republicans carried the State by 60,000. The Democratic and Silver Republicans Congressmen are elected. The Legislature is anti Republican.

Boise, Idaho, November 9.—Women voted for the first time yesterday. Party lines were ignored, and the result is doubtful.

San Francisco, Cal., November 9.—The Republicans have everything. They will elect a Republican to succeed Senator White. They elect six of the seven Congressmen.

Seattle, Wash., November 9.—The Republicans made heavy gains in the election yesterday.

Indianapolis, Ind., November 9.—The State has probably gone Republican by 5,000. The Republicans get four Congressmen and the Democrats eight. The Legislature is doubtful.

The Legislature is Republican, meaning the retirement of Senator Turpie.

Chicago, Ill., November 9.—The Republican plurality is 20,000. Several Congressional districts are in doubt.

Louisville, Ky., November 9.—The Republicans get one and the Democrats ten Congressmen.

Nashville, Tenn., November 9.—The Democratic Governor has 25,000 majority. Eight Democrats and two Republicans are elected to Congress.

Minneapolis, Minn., November 9.—Lind, fusion, is elected Governor by 10,000. Five out of seven Congressmen are Republicans, and the other two are doubtful.

Milwaukee, Wis., November 9.—The State is Republican by 20,000. The Legislature is Republican.

Lincoln, Neb., November 9.—Belated returns indicate that the Republicans will carry the State by 20,000. The Legislature is close, and probably Republican. Two Republican and two Fusion Congressmen are elected with two in doubt.
