

THE BOERS' BIG VICTORY AN ATTACK ON LABOR. ROBERTS FIGHTS BOTHA. MR. N. F. THOMPSON MAKES AN

ATTACK ON LABOR UNIONS.

He Creates a Sensation Before the Industrial Commission - Labor Unions the Greatest Menace to the Government that Exists Inside or Outside of the National Demain.

Washington, June 12 .- N. F. Thompson, secretary of the Southern Industrial Convention at Huntsville, Ala., made a somewhat sensational attack upon labor unions before the Industrial Commission to-day. "Labor organizations," said Mr. Thompson, "are the greatest menace to this government that exists inside or outside the pale of our national domain. Their influence for disruption and disorganization of society is far more dangerous to the perpetuation of our government in its purity and power than would be the hostile array on our borders of the armies of the entire world combined."

A strike and boycotts, he thought, should be made a felony, both by national and State legislation, and he suggested the formation of State and national boards of arbitration, authorized and empowered to settle all matters of differences between labor and capital, and whose decrees should be binding on the parties affected.

Mr. Thompson expressed the opinion that public sentiment in the South would justify the shooting of union men who interfered with non-union men at work. He said that the South was holding out as inducements to the manufacturers of textiles that if they came South they would be free from labor strikes. There is, he said, a movement on foot to put it beyond the power of labor unions by means of compulsory arbitration to disturb industrial conditions.

Mr. Thompson expressed the opinion that negro labor was essential to the prosperity of the South, and he also said that the South was very prosperous at the present time.

BOBS LEAV. S THE FIELD WITH BOTHA UNDEFEATED.

The British Commander's Line of Communication Practically Restored-Methuen and Kitchener Gain a Complete Victory Over General Dewet-All Quiet at Pretoria and Johannesburg.

London, June 14.-3:50 a. m.-The dispatch from Lord Roberts clearing up the situation at Pretoria and along the communications stands alone. Military observers, noting that no mention is made of prisoners, assume that General Dewet got away with his forces practically intact.
