Dante's Massive Brain

Dante was not a Nordic, as so anthropologists have asserted. But member of the Mediterranean race. So declared Prof. Fablo Fassetto of the University of Bologna, in a paper presented to the American Association of Anatomists at their meeting in Buf-falo, N. Y. The evidence is from a recent examination of the bones of the

great poet. The most important feature of the skeleton is the large capacity of the cranium or brain case. This is 1,700 cubic centimeters, or much more than the average even among men of high intellect. Dante's height was about 5 intellect. Dante's height was about 5 feet 5 inches. The shape of the bones of the head definitely identifies Dante, according to Professor Fassetto, with the Mediterranean race, contrary to the opinions of those who believed the poet's name and family to have been of German origin.
