### Superintendents' Association.

The twenty-four page Public School Edition of the News & Observer, issued on Tuesday, July 9, contained a cut of Supt. C. W. Toms, of the Durham City School, and had the following to say about him:

Prof. C. W. Toms is one of the youngest superintendents in the South, as well as one of the most energetic and progressive, he being twenty-six years of age.

He was born in Hertford, N. C., and prepared for college in the High School of that town. He was prepared for and entered the University of the State at the age of fifteen, graduating in four years with the class of '89. Shortly after graduation he established the Plymouth High School at Plymouth, N. C. While teaching at Plymouth he began to look at life seriously, and there was awakefied in him a keen and deep interest in educatian. He saw the way in which those who did not have the privilege of schools and education would have to grow, and realized how much the importance and prosperity of a State rests upon the edu cation of her sons; the result was that he began to interest himself in public education. He was soon elected to a professorship in the Graded Schools of Durham; then in a very short while he was elected Principal of the Grammar School. His work in this department immediately began to attract attention and praise throughout the town, and it was not long before Professor.

## PERQUIMANS.

Perquimans county has 27 school districts for the white race, and 19 for the colored race. During the last year, school was taught in 24 districts for whites and 18 for the colored people, with an average length of term of 12 weeks for whites and 13 weeks for colored schools. The length of term was below the average, owing to a want of funds, and the average attendance was smaller than usual by reason of the very severe weather during part of the school term, and the fact that some of our school buildings are necessarily located in sparsely settled districts.

By reason of rivers and swamps our county is divided into smaller districts than is desirable.

A very large majority of the teachers held first or second grade certificates, and they generally manifested a laudable interest in the work they undertook.

I am impressed with the fact that the want of suitable school furniture and a lack of active supervision of schools are serious Toms was known as one of the most drawbacks in the work. The want

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
