"We favor the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, we demand that the congress immediately propose a constitutional amendment to purely represent the conventions in the states called to act solely on that proposal..."

"We urge the enactment of such measures by the several states as will actively promote temperance, effectively prevent the return of the saloon and bring the liquor traffic into the open under complete supervision and control by the states..."

"We demand that the federal government effectively exercise its power to enable the states to effectually protect themselves against importation of intoxicating liquors in violation of their laws..."

"Pending repeal, we favor immediate modification of the Volstead act to realize the manufacture and sale of beer and other beverages of such alcoholic content as is permissible under the constitution and to provide therefor a proper and needed revenue..."

TOXAWAY RESIDENT SUC-CUMBS TUESDAY AFTER ALLEGED ASSAULT

CLIFFORD FISHER HELD FOR CRIME

Evidence Points Toward Brutal Attack, Officers Say

Clifford Fisher of the Keids Siding section is being held in Transylvania county jail charged with the death of Will J. Fisher, 55-year-old resident of the Lake Toxaway section. The prominent elderly man died early Tuesday morning at Lyday Memorial hospital, where he was brought Monday in a serious condition, without regaining consciousness. Evidence presented at the coroner's inquest held Tuesday at noon at the Brevard Undertaking parlors was to the effect that Clifford Fisher, a distant relative of the deceased, was responsible for the death of Will Fisher, it being alleged that Clifford struck him several times over the head and face with an iron rod late Sunday afternoon, and then brutally assaulted the stricken man while he lay unconscious. It was the opinion of the jury summoned to hear the case, that the blows which practically gave in the face of the dead man also fractured the base of his skull, causing death. They recommended that Young Fisher be held without bond, and preliminary hearing has been set for Monday morning, July 11, at ten o'clock. The effort took place at the home of Ben Thomas in the Reid Siding section about seven o'clock last Sunday afternoon, according to evidence brought out at the inquest before Dr. G. B. Lynch. Edwin Owen, son of Ben Thomas, was the principal witness at the hearing, and it was upon his testimony that the coroner's jury based its verdict. According to the evidence given by Mr. Owen, he and Miss Ruth and Nettie Thomas were on their way to church late Sunday afternoon, and upon reaching the home of Ben Thomas, were attracted by the loud talk and cursing going on in the residence. Standing in the road which runs within a few feet of the Thomas home, he testified that Will Fisher was either shoved or knocked out the front door and that Clifford Fisher followed immediately behind him. After the elder man had taken only a few steps, Owen testified, he was struck by Clifford Fisher with a weapon, identified as an iron rod about two feet long in length, from behind and knocked to the ground. Clifford then pulled his victim up and again struck him with the weapon, repeating this malicious practice three times. Clifford then stung the injured man against a chimney with the weapon, and jumped on the fallen man, stamping him about the head and body. He then shoved him over a small embankment. Still not satisfied, as it appeared from the witness' testimony, Clifford then tried to have got on the then unconscious man and threatened to cut his throat unless he was gone in ten minutes.
