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SEEKING FLOUR SHIPMENT FOR NEEDY PEOPLE

Red Cross Chairman Asks For New Supply From Government Wheat

SUPPLY IS EXHAUSTED IN THIS COUNTY

Many People Dependent On Red Cross Flour For Their Existence

Announcement was made Tuesday by Mr. Silverstein that another shipment of flour would be received in the county within ten days to three weeks.

Effort is being made by Joe S. Silverstein, chairman of the Transylvania chapter American Red Cross to secure another car load of flour to be distributed among the needy of the county.

Last of the previous shipment was distributed last week, and many families of the county will suffer from lack of food unless another supply is procured from the government-owned wheat.

While distribution has been under supervision of the local chapter of the Red Cross, actual work has been done by committees of citizens in each community who have given of their time without charge.

Substitutions have been maintained at Lake Toxaway, Rosman and Pisgah Forest, with main station at Brevard. W. H. Arrowood has served as dispenser at Lake Toxaway since the arrival of Mrs. A. C. Clarke, Craig Whitmore has been in charge of the supply room at Rosman, with Robert W. Jones as dispenser at Pisgah Forest. Mrs. A. B. Galloway and C. M. Douglas have been largely responsible for the work in Brevard, assistance being given by W. A. Williams.

Care has been taken at all stations to have the flour given only to those in need, committees of reputable people in each community being selected for recommendations for those who have been given aid.

Effort has been made on several occasions to "census" trouble in the district by people who felt "duty-bound" to kick on the way the flour was being distributed, and in some instances checking up has revealed that unscrupulous people had received one or more bags. However, the carefully selected committee members have been very faithful in observing the rules of the government and the national Red Cross. Those people who are well informed as to manner of distribution, and the further fact that no one derives any salary, commission or benefit from handling the flour, have accomplished workers on the way the situation has been handled, and have assisted in making the task less onerous.

Letters, thanking each worker for the efficient way in which they have done the vast amount of work, are being distributed to all of the flour were mailed the first of this week by the chairman, as follows:
