Items of interest gleaned during the past week

Bumper Crops Blamed Chicago—Secretary Wallace declared in an address delivered here last week that bumper crops was the cause of low price on farm products, that inflation would not materially help, but might, he said, tend to increase the woes of the farmers.

State Shows Big Deficit Raleigh—It cost the state of North Carolina \$47,008,072 to operate its government, including all costs, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, while total receipts were only \$44,061,761.

May Recognize Russia Washington—Early recognition of Soviet Russia is expected before November first, Secretary Hull indicating this in a statement made public last week.

Wiley Post Injured Quincy, Ill.—Wiley Post, round the world flier crashed here Thursday, shortly after taking off, and was found sitting in his plane in a dazed condition. He was not seriously injured.

Hill Not Wet Candidate Asheville—Dan W. Hill, for years postmaster here, will not be wet candidate from this county, according to a statement made public by him last week. Mr. Hill said that he would be out of the city for most of the time prior to election.

Dies When Informed of His Victory Darby, Pa.—When told last night that he had won the Republican nomination for councilman of Darby, Robert B. Montgomery, 68, dropped dead from a heart attack.

Widow Gets Compensation Asheville—Mrs. Lonnie Russel, widow of an Asheville filling station operator who was slain by bandits during a hold-up last September, has been awarded \$6,000 in compensation by the North Carolina Industrial commission.

Sally Rand "Indecent" Chicago—Sally Rand, of fan dancing notoriety, was convicted of presenting an indecent dance by a jury in municipal court here last week and sentenced to a year in jail. She was also fined \$200 and costs. The charges were based on her appearance in a loop theatre following the presentation of her act at a world fair concession which brought her considerable publicity.
