JACK ARRINGTON DIES IN VIRGINIA

PISGAH FOREST, October 2.—The following clipping taken from a Virginia paper was sent to Mr. Herbert (Jack) Arrington of this section a son of the late M. Arrington: Mr. Arrington is a former resident of this section and has many friends here who will be sorry to learn of his death: "Larkin D. Arrington, 56 years old died at Danville hospital at three o'clock this morning from injuries received when he was struck by a street car on lower Main street Saturday night about ten o'clock. Mr. Arrington received a fractured skull and internal injuries when he was knocked down by a car driven by motorman J. L. Allen as he was attempting to cross the street. Officer W. F. Brincefield investigated the accident for the police department but no charges were brought in the case. The accident victim was taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition in the automobile of Ernest Yeatts, a passer-by. At first his injuries were not thought to be serious, but it was apparent upon the taking of x-ray pictures yesterday that his condition was grave. Mr. Arrington lived at 406 Arnett's Road and is survived by his wife and four children as follows: M. M. Arrington of South Carolina, Herbert Arrington of Pisgah Forest, Mrs. Raleigh Allison of Biltmore, and Holland Arrington. Funeral service was conducted at the residence. Interment was made in the Schoolfield cemetery.

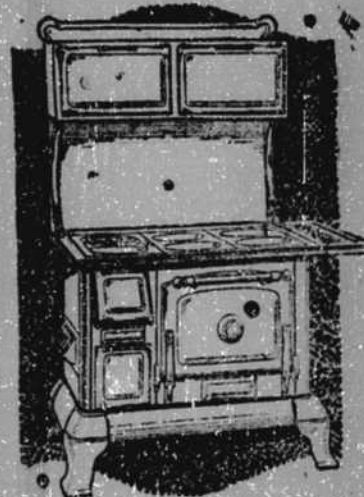
Upper District B. Y. P. U. convention will be held Sunday afternoon at Calvert Baptist church, an interesting program being arranged, including:
