The ceremony occurred at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Lewis, in Weaverville, at noon on Tuesday, October 17. The Rev. James Finley Matney, of Statesville, uncle of the bride and retired Methodist Episcopal minister, officiated. Of interest was the fact that the same minister performed the ceremony at the marriage of the bride's father and mother 30 years ago.

The ceremony was performed in the presence of the bride's parents and a few close friends. The only out-of-town guests were Mrs. L. W. Brooks, of Brevard, great aunt of the bride, the Rev. and Mrs. J. P. Matney, of Statesville, uncle and aunt of the bride, and Mr. Matney Harmon, also of Statesville.

The bride wore her mother's wedding dress of ivory silk with cape collar of all over lace and applique insertion trimming the long full sleeves, circular flounce and train. She carried her paternal grandmother's prayer book from which fell a shower of knotted satin ribbon and rose buds. Her only ornaments were two quaint old sterling rings which belonged to her maternal grandmother.

Miss Linnie Charles, who has been nurse at Lyday Memorial hospital for some time, left last week for her home in South Carolina.

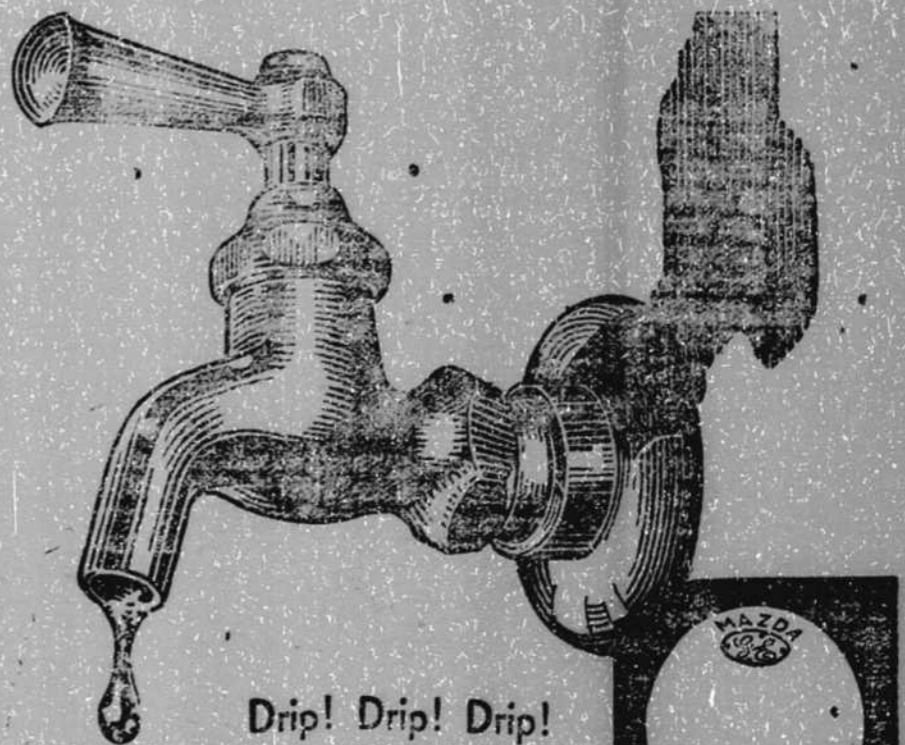
