(By Charles Morgan) The fast feet of David Price stepped from his own 10 yard line to touch down in Brevard's victory over Farm School, 21 to 0 here Saturday. The 90 yard run came in his last period for the climax of the game.

In the second quarter, Neil covered a punt in mid field, then a short pass for 5 yards was followed by a 20 yard pass to Neil for the first tally. English tossed one to Walter Clayton for the extra point. Morris caught one in the third period and crossed the six point line. Price was clear to receive the ball for one more point.

Then Price intercepted a pass and ran 90 yards, Edward Clayton marking another extra point by taking the pass from English.

The same passing attack that won over hard teams last season defeated a heavier driving team. No team as yet has stopped the English to Clayton, Morris and Price combination.

The outstanding player for Farm School was Cordell, full back. He marked up long gains and played good defense. L. Laree played his best game since he has been on the ground. No gains were made over his side of the line. His blocking was good, and his tackling was perfect. He was the outstanding player of the day.

Farm School marked up 4 first downs to the Blue Devils. 6; 124 yards were gained by running by the visitors, while the beans netted only 42. Brevard completed 5 passes out of 7 for 63 yards. Farm School tried 12 making 3 good, and two were intercepted. Brevard's average on the punts was 32 yards while Farm School's was 25 yards. Both teams were penalized 65 yards.

The following news story taken from The Fayetteville Observer of Oct. 25, tells of the accidental death of Julian C. Yarborough, of near that city. Mr. Yarborough was a brother of Mrs. G. H. Lyday of Davidson River.

Julian C. Yarborough, 36, was instantly killed at the home of his father, Frank C. Yarborough, in Gray's Creek township, when an automatic pistol which he was cleaning discharged.

The young man had removed the magazine from the pistol and apparently was unaware that one cartridge remained in the chamber. When it discharged the bullet passed through his body just below the heart, ranging upward, and causing instant death.

He was cleaning the pistol preparatory to swapping it for a rifle to go hunting. The accident occurred in the dining room of his father's home and his mother was seated nearby.

Mr. Yarborough was well liked and his tragic death came as a shock to his community. His father is one of the most prominent farmers of the section and a former member of the Board of county commissioners. Dr. J. Vance McGougan, county coroner, announced that an inquest will be held a day or two after the funeral.

The deceased is survived by his wife, Mrs. Myrtle L. Yarborough; three children, W. J. Jane and J. C. Jr., his parents, F. C. Yarborough and Mrs. Kemelia Yarborough; three sisters, Mrs. Jasper Edge, of Hope Mills, Mrs. G. H. Lyday, of Davidson River, and Mrs. H. T. Bowen, of Jappa, Md.; and by four brothers, Rev. W. D. Yarborough, of Laurel
