

CREDIT ASSOCIATION STILL DESTROYED IN ORGANIZED TO GIVE LONG CREEK SECTION RELIEF TO FARMERS

H. Arthur Osborne of Haywood county was chosen temporary chairman of the Asheville Production Credit association which was organized at a meeting Wednesday in the Asheville courthouse. The purpose of this organization for which farmers from Transylvania, Buncombe, Madison, Haywood, and Henderson counties gathered in Asheville, is to aid farmers by granting them loans on their crops and live stock.

Three incorporators from each county were elected at county group meetings following the general session with one incorporator from each county being named to the board of directors. Transylvania incorporators are: E. Carl Allison, E. O. Shipman and K. H. Holden with Mr. Holden being named to the directory board. Directors who will hold a meeting at a later date and elect permanent officers for that group are: Harry L. Nettles, John Hudgens, Louis Gwynn, R. R. Ramsay and Mr. Holden.

The group will accept applications for farmers for loans and will turn the applications over to the Federal office at Columbia, S. C. The organization will be incorporated and capital set at \$40,000. Of this amount, the government will contribute \$20,000 and the other \$20,000 will be secured by Class B stock which the borrower will have to put up.

GEORGIA TO PAVE RABUN GAP ROAD

HIGHLANDS, Dec. 20.—The approval by the State Highway board of Georgia of the plan for paving the eight and one-half mile stretch of the Three-State highway in Rabun county, Georgia, was given last week. The plan provides for financing the project as follows: The United States forestry service will pay \$42,000 on the east of the road and the State of Georgia is to supply the remaining cost, which is estimated at approximately \$42,000.

Seven miles of the Three-State road between Highlands and Walhalla, S. C. is in North Carolina, and is not paved, but is well graded and graveled. The portion in South Carolina is paved. The paving of the Georgia link will be an improvement which will shorten the route between Highland and Southern cities. Effort is being made by representative North Carolina citizens of this section to bring about the paving of the seven miles of road on the North Carolina side.

Work on the project is expected to begin at once.

ACCOMMODATING BREAD TRUCK LEFT LOAVES FOR MANY

Transylvanians should not worry about existing conditions, believes Frank Duckworth, in Brevard for the Christmas season, who on a return trip from Asheville found the highway laden with heaven-sent manna or loaves of bread, according to the strength of the reader's imagination.

Mr. Duckworth upon rounding a sharp curve on the Brevard road lay in the immediate stretch ahead, loaves and loaves of bread, lying carelessly here and there as though blown upon the ground by a sudden blizzard storm. He brought his car to a halt and soon had it filled with abundant supply. Little girls were securing the road for other loaves.

Now if it were not known that several bread trucks speed around these curves every day Mr. Duckworth would still wonder if the loaves were not sent from heaven to feed the hungry people of this county.

MONEY COLLECTED IN COUNTY BY NEW TAX

A total of \$2,568.77 in sales tax was collected in Transylvania county during July, August and September, according to figures released by the State Department of Revenue. Collections for the three months were as follows: July, \$682.45; August, \$728.90; September, \$1,157.42.

Property tax relief afforded by the sales tax, according to the statement is as follows: District levies, current expense, \$26,455.00; 15-cent county-wide levy, \$13,924.90; current expenses for six month school, \$2,611.00, making a total of \$42,990.90.

Figures given above represent the actual reductions in dollar levies which were received in your county by reason of the fact that the State of North Carolina took over the operation of the entire eight-month school term. In taking over our schools, the State reduced the cost of operation in the schools which amounted in 1932 to approximately \$23,000,000.00 to approximately \$15,000,000.00 for 1933, thereby resulting in a saving to the taxpayers of the State of approximately \$7,000,000.00 in operating cost. The property tax relief afforded for the entire State amounted to \$11,476,540.00 as shown by the above tabulations.

CHURCH LACKS FOR MEMBER INTEREST

The Rev. J. McDowell Richards, president of Columbia Theological Seminary, Decatur, Ga., preached at the eleven o'clock hour at the Brevard-Davidson River Presbyterian church last Sunday morning, delivering a very forceful and intensely interesting sermon.

Nothing an inclination on the part of so many church members to remain away when unable to offer financial support to their church, Dr. Richards emphasized the fact that the church is far more in need of the moral support of its members during crises such as the present one than the mere support of dollars and cents. He urged that none be ashamed to lend his efforts, even though unable to contribute to the church silver or gold.

Another important point stressed by Dr. Richards is that of criticizing the church and its ministers. He believes that ministers and the church should be criticized when and if needed but he holds that it should be done constructively, telling the minister in a helpful manner, where the trouble may be and helping him correct it. He pointed out that members are too prone to criticize their church and minister before those who would gain an unfavorable impression and especially in the case of young people, who may be driven from the church because of these impressions.

In his closing remarks, Dr. Richards urged wholehearted cooperation that the work of the church might go on despite the trials it is forced to face, and has faced the past few years.
