

GOVERNOR REFUSES TO ISSUE PARDON FOR BREVARD MEN

not connected with the case; that a total of \$218,600 had been paid out by the board of commissioners from the time resolution authorizing the \$100,000 note had been made in September 1930 until their term of office expired December first, following; and that there had been no conspiracy or intent of conspiracy between members of the board of commissioners and the Brevard Banking company.

In passing sentence after hearing the men, Judge Townsend declared that he was not allowed to pass upon the matter of guilt in the case, it being his duty to take the verdict as had been rendered by the jury and uphold the supreme court and re-sentence the men. However, he made provision, after sentencing the men to from two to three years in the state penitentiary, that if they paid into the county \$30,000 and costs of the case he would recommend to the governor that he pardon or parole them.

Settlement was made by the defendants with the county commissioners and recommendation of the commissioners were made to the governor for a pardon.

Tyre C. Taylor, executive counsel for Governor J. C. B. Ehringhaus, held a public hearing in Brevard on March 25, 1933 at the court house attended by around 300 people at which time not a single protest in opposition to the pardon was heard. It was generally assumed at that time that a pardon would be granted within a short while.

All the men are prominent in business and social circles of this section of the state. Mr. Pickelsimer has served as sheriff, and chairman of the board of county commissioners two terms, was president of the Pisgah Industrial Bank at Brevard and active in other business affairs of the county. He is now a member

of the board of trustees for Brevard College.

Mr. Shipman worked his way from the bottom rung of the ladder in this county to the presidency of the Brevard Banking company, and served one year as president of the North Carolina Bankers' association. He has also been president of the Brevard Kiwanis Club and president of the Chamber of Commerce, and otherwise active in community and civic affairs.

Mr. McNeely, prior to being elected as county commissioner and as county accountant in 1928, was in the hardwood lumber business at Lake Toxaway, and also one of the biggest mercantile operators in the upper end of the county.

Mr. Fisher, a world war veteran, has served in the State Legislature from Transylvania county, and was candidate for Congress from this district several years ago. As an attorney, he held large practice in Western North Carolina.

Items of interest gleaned during the past week

Large Earth Fractures Discovered

Fallen, Nevada—A crack in the earth known depth extending for five miles in a zig-zag line from southeast to northwest is believed to be widening gradually. Several smaller cracks also have been observed in the mountainous area 16 miles distant. They are believed to be the result of earthquakes about a year ago, the fractures, from a foot to six feet wide, reaching the surface only recently.

To Face Trial

Denver, Colo.—Miss Edith M. Thomas, daughter of Charles S. Thomas, former governor of Colorado and U. S. Senator, will have to face trial in the U. S. Court. She is charged with violating President Roosevelt's anti-gold hoarding order. She will, if convicted have to pay a \$10,000 fine and serve a ten-year sentence.

Boat Capsized In Ohio River

East Liverpool, Ohio—A dog's restlessness cost the lives of three persons near here today as their boat capsized in the Ohio river. The three were en route to their homes at Georgetown, Pa., when their pet police dog suddenly over balanced the boat by jumping from one side to the other. The dog swam ashore.

Baltimore—Completely recovered from a "very dangerous" brain operation for which she was rushed by airplane from Houston, Texas, to Baltimore on Dec. 27, six-month-old Sue Trammell left for home by train Monday.

Hevia Becomes Cuban Ruler

Havana—Carlos Hevia, 53 year-old graduate of the United States naval academy, accepted the presidency of Cuba Monday after a chaotic day during which nobody knew who was running the country. He succeeds Ramon Grau San Martin who retired.

Wiles Sentenced To Die

Columbia, S. C.—Robert H. Wiles South Carolina's first kidnaper-killer in modern years, was sentenced to death Saturday, three weeks after he beat to death a 15-year old schoolboy. He will die in the electric chair March 12th.

Naval Planes Land At Hawaii

Six Naval planes completed a 2,400 mile flight from California to Hawaii last Thursday. This was the greatest overseas mass flight in history. The planes averaged a speed of one hundred miles per hour, completing the trip in twenty-six hours. The planes were being transferred by the Naval Department from California to Hawaii. A similar trip which was tried several years ago, ended unsuccessfully with the loss of several planes.
