Items of interest gleaned during the past week

Italians Guard Their Frontier Rome—Ready for any eventuality, 75,000 Italian troops were posted Thursday at strategic points along the Austrian frontier.

Eggs Truck Burns Edenton, N. C.—If Henry Jones had been hungry this would have been his lucky day.

Football Hero Acquitted El Paso—A jury of Texans last night acquitted Lieut. John H. Murrell, former West Point football hero, on both counts in an indictment charging attack on Blanche Ralls, pretty Alabama divorcee.

Traylor Dead Chicago—Melvin A. Traylor, president of the First National bank and a candidate in 1932 for the Presidency, died Wednesday night of last week after a month's illness of pneumonia.

Flyer Burned To Death New Orleans—Capt Merle Nelson of Hollywood, Calif., was burned to death last week here when his rocket ship nose dived after several stunts at a very low altitude.

French To Seek Political Truce Paris—Premier Gaston Doumergue's national union cabinet drafted a ministerial declaration Thursday appealing to parliament for a political truce to allow France to solve her internal and external problems.

Socialists Licked Vienna—Driven underground into the sewers of Vienna, the scattered forces of the fleeing Socialist Republic Guard were fighting a desperate guerrilla warfare Thursday, still disputing the authority of the Austrian government.

Austria Drafts To Dictatorship Vienna—Blood bathed and revolution-torn Austria headed again toward Fascist statehood Friday under the absolute dictatorship of Chancellor Engelbert Dollfus and Prince Ernst von Stachemberg.

Three Army Pilots Killed Salt Lake City—Death inaugurated military preparations to fly the mail Saturday before a single pilot had been carried.

Oil King In Weak State Ormond Beach, Fla.—John D. Rockefeller, Sr., who Saturday arrived at his home here for a stay in a feeble condition after having in a tough fight of flu at his New York home, which delayed his trip here. He is 94 years old.

History Repeats Itself Hays, Kans.—Mrs. Mary Flenze simply detected the numbers of her automobile plates last year. The numbers—38-2222—were hard to pronounce without stuttering.

England and Russia Sign Trade Treaty London—Great Britain and Russia signed an important trade treaty here Friday. It was regarded, from the British viewpoint, as a move designed to offset disadvantageous stimulation of United States trade with the Soviet republic.

Hill To Get Position Asheville—Dan W. Hill, prominent Asheville insurance man and one-time postmaster, will be appointed as assistant treasurer of the Republican national committee, it was learned here Friday.

Laure Arrested Tampa—Edward Laure, wanted in the \$2,000,000 robbery of the Lincoln National Bank Trust company, of Lincoln, Neb., and in the kidnaping of James Hackett, Blue Island, Ill., was arrested here Friday.

A Mean Robber Jeannette, Pa.—A lot of robberies have come under the head of "meanest" but Jeannette adds this one. Somebody sneaked into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Myers and stole a pair of crutches belonging to Bernice Myers, 13, an infantile paralysis cripple.

American Citizen Killed In Fight New York—O. Borowitz, New York restaurateur, was informed Thursday by cable that his 17-year-old daughter, Alice, an American citizen, had died of wounds received in a Vienna street fight.

Mother Nature Mixes Dates Ketchikan, Alaska—Mother nature seemed to have her dates mixed here this week-end. With a temperature of 57 degrees above zero, the warmest for February in 21 years, youngsters swam in the channel and buds appeared on bushes and strawberry plants.

Brown Appears Before Senate Washington—Walter Brown, postmaster general under former President Hoover, appeared voluntarily before the senate airmail investigating committee Monday to answer charges of fraud and collusion in mail contracts awards during his administration.

An Extra Long Congress Washington—President Roosevelt won't be able to get away for the sea-going vacation in April, it became plain Monday. It was expected that present session of Congress would last into the summer.

Asheville Couple Robbed Asheville—T. R. Spalding, assistant superintendent of the Great Atlantic and Pacific stores in Asheville, and Mrs. Spalding were held up and robbed Saturday night of a sack estimated by police to contain \$2,000 in currency.

Belgium King Dead Brussels, Belgium—Albert I, King of the Belgians, was killed Sunday afternoon in a mountaineering accident. He was climbing up a steep cliff when a piece of rock which he was holding to gave way letting him fall to the foot far below. He was 59 years old.

Austria Must Remain Free Paris—France, England and Italy agreed in a declaration Monday that Austria's independence must be maintained. In other words she must not unite with Germany or any other country.

Weather Halts Airmail Washington—Army fliers took over the air mail Monday under dangerous conditions which caused cancellation of some schedules and made completions of others doubtful.

China Building Bases With U. S. Funds Tokyo—Reports that a portion of America's \$50,000,000 cotton and wheat loan to China is being used in the expansion of Chinese airbases to Pechow and Amoy will be the subject shortly of Japanese diplomatic representations to China, it was learned Monday.

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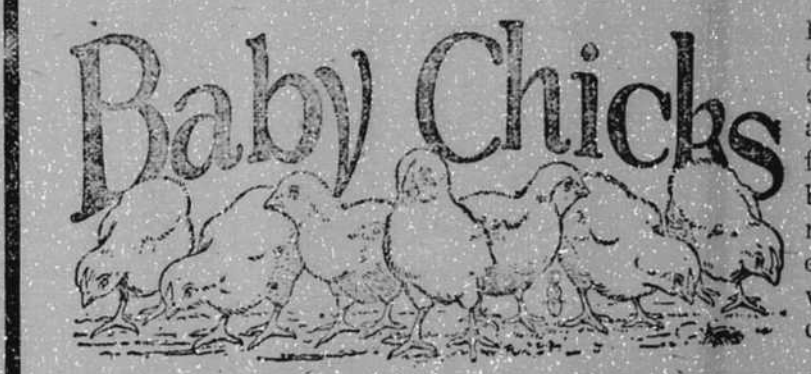
