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FOREST FIRES ARE DAMAGING COUNTY

Why people in Transylvania can be so careless as to allow forest fires to take the toll that they have been taking for the past year is beyond all reason.

With the small amount of saleable timber that is left in the county one would think that every safeguard would be taken by everyone, that fire-bugs (and careless people should be classed as such) would be given treatment that would cause them to be more careful next time, and that fellows who persist in setting fire to woodlands which they do not own would be run out of the county.

Look out on the hills in any direction and note the bleak, cold, raw, ugly scene where fire has done its worst. Then look upon the side of a beautiful mountain where care has been taken of the young timber, even though the saleable stuff has been cut out and marketed, and then imagine the difference a visitor who comes here for his first time would notice.

Forests, that is beautiful forests, growing alongside and over the mountain streams that we are so greatly blessed with constitute our biggest asset, and should be guarded zealously by those who have the best interests of the county at heart.

Who will we go to war with next? asks a newspaper headline.... We move that we have no more wars until the last one is paid for.

Now that's something interesting and MIGHT be applicable to Brevard with good results — Canton and Waynesville have curfew laws which are destined to keep kids under sixteen years of age off the streets after the sun has set one hour. We've seen 'em under sixteen and still uptown in Brevard until an hour before sunrise.

Any candidate who wants to know the real reason why we absolutely refuse to accept political advertising "on a credit" will be given privilege of seeing our political page in the ledger of 1931—lot of entries on the left hand side and few on the right.

WHO IS TO BLAME

 Senator Reynolds grows rather fervid in his regrets that the people of North Carolina are not coming in for their full and proper share of the benefits flowing from the Home Owners Loan Corporation.

The burden of his remarks falls the heavier upon the office of the State administration, at least by implication and direction.

He simply says that there is something wrong about the way the agency is functioning in this State and he is earnest in his plans to see that whatever the monkey-wrench may be, it will be thrown out of the machinery.

The Senator should complete his investigation, if he has started any, in order to find out exactly just where the trouble is.

There are some obstacles in the way of State administration—at least conceivable obstacles—which would not be removed no matter what sort of man may be put in control of this important office.

Perhaps the difficulty is not in the administration at all, but in the circumstance that the mortgage-holders won't take the bonds of the Government in exchange for their first liens. That, at least, could be a very reasonable and reliance explanation for the improper or partial functioning of this office.

The Senator would be contributing a service were he to ascertain if this is the case or not.

If it is, whether there is one administration or a dozen, whether Mr. O'Neal is at the head of the business or the most vigorous and alert executive anywhere to be found in the land, the office would be desultory in its efforts and the service could not be given.

Mrs. A. H. King has moved into a portion of the Hume residence during the business trip of Doc in southern fields.

Thos. L. Waters has gone south with four fine mules which he hopes to exchange for livery horses. He is preparing for an increased business next summer.

M. P. Holcombe was among the arrivals from Asheville on Tuesday. He enjoyed (?) the ride on horseback the coldest day of the winter over the worst of roads—of course he did.

O. J. Erwin has made desirable improvements at his place at Greenwood, moving and enlarging his store building, and beautifying his residence grounds.

Miss Mattie Neill has returned to her home here after a month's visit among friends in Virginia.

Mrs. E. B. Clayton, nee Mrs. B. C. Lankford, moved to her new home near Enon this week.

The Brevard Banking company opened for business on Tuesday with a paid in capital of \$10,000. The organization consists of N. McMinn, president; Z. W. Nichols, cashier; T. D. England, W. A. Gash and J. W. McMinn directors. The honor of being first on the list of depositors belongs to R. R. Deaver who left something more than \$900 in the bank. The News is making an effort to get \$5 ahead so as to become a depositor, but bills come in faster than money. The private cottage of J. F. Hayes at Fairfield is one of the most imposing residences near the company property.

A how-up at the Racket Store yesterday morning created considerable excitement. It seems that in moving the Glenville stock back to Brevard a keg of powder which had been opened got scattered about the floor. Fire got among it somehow and an explosion followed. Several were slightly burned, among whom are Clyde Duckworth and Mrs. Sonora Robinson, and Jas. Walters was severely burned. The front windows were blown out into the street and some slight damage to the stock of goods will result. It might have been worse.

A party rode last week over one of the routes which it is expected will be utilized in constructing the new road to Sapphire. NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

E. Gaston Whitmire has been duly appointed County Supervisor of Taxation and will soon appoint the Tax Listers for the various townships in the County and he will advertise the place and time where the property owners in the several townships can list their property for taxation.

A great many property owners have failed to list their property in the past and it costs the County a large sum each year to search the records and make out accurate lists.

Under the provisions of law, the property owner is required to list his taxes with the tax lister during the period fixed by law for such listing and if the property owner fails, neglects or refuses to so list his property, he is liable to indictment.

Therefore, in order to have a true and correct tax list of all the property in the County, the County Appraiser of Taxation will have to proceed by law against each and every taxpayer who fails or neglects to list his property during the time provided for same.

Notice will be given by advertisement in the Transylvania Times and also by notices posted at several places in each Township when and where the Tax Lister can be found by the property owner, and all citizens are now notified that they are expected to meet said Tax Lister and list their property and thereby save themselves from additional cost of legal action against them.
