WASHINGTON, April 18—Adjournment of Congress during May is the confident prediction—and hope—of Democratic leaders.

The Administration has been over-ridden on the veterans question costing the budget millions of dollars. Pending are the McLeod bill to pay off depositors in closed National and Federal Reserve banks, silver inflation legislation and other measures to which the President is opposed. There are definite indications that much legislation which he would like to see enacted at this session will be laid aside, to avoid further legislation which the Administration considers unwise.

At the same time, the belief is growing in sound Democratic circles that business needs time to adjust itself to the many emergency measures already enacted.

Thousands Killed In Clash
ASCUNCION, Paraguay—Death estimates mounted Monday with reports of a major engagement that may prove the turning point in the long Gran Chaco warfare between Bolivia and Paraguay. Before Monday's reports, it had been estimated that 75,000 men have been slain or wounded in the period of both unofficial and official war since August, 1932.

CCC Camps Spend Huge Sum
WASHINGTON—Monday President Roosevelt was told that \$255,000,000 was spent in giving employment to 600,000 young men during the first year of the civilian conservation corps.

Robert Fechner, director of emergency conservation work, reported to the chief executive that 310,000 would still be in the forest camps at the end of April. Funds have been appropriated to continue the program for another six months.

Bishop Has No Plans to Retire
NASHVILLE, Tenn.—While declaring that his conviction in court or superannuation by the church would "greatly delight my enemies," Bishop James Cannon, Jr., said in a statement Tuesday in the Christian Advocate that he had no intention of asking retirement.

CHICAGO—Mrs. Jessie Touhy, wife of the absent "Tommy" Touhy, gangster, will be taken to Asheville by deputy marshalls Monday to face trial in federal court for possession of part of the \$105,000 loot obtained by Touhy gang members at Charlotte several months ago.

Dirigible Macon to Make Cruise To East Coast
SUNNYVALE, Calif.—The dirigible Macon will make a major cruise eastward the first favorable day after April 16, navy officers announced at its base here Monday. The big airship will proceed down the Santa Clara valley to Los Angeles and eastward to El Paso and Miami, Fla.
