TIMELY FARM QUESTION ANSWERED AT S. COLLEGE
 Question: Present prices of eggs do not justify feeding my entire flock. What should be done?
 Answer: The flock should be culled and all low producing birds taken from the flock and sold. A number of birds in all flocks are now becoming unprofitable and this number will increase as the season advances. The broody birds should be removed. The practice of culling will materially lower the feed bill. Extension Circular No. 156 on "How to Cull" explains the method in detail and copies will be mailed free on application to F. H. Jeter, agricultural editor at State College.
