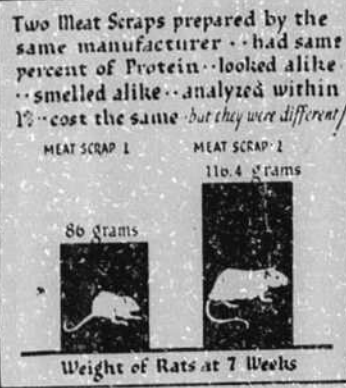

### Who Is the Best Judge of Quality in Meat Scraps?

A white laboratory rat has never been known to get its name in the Hall of Fame of Who's Who. Yet this modest little creature has contributed so much to the advancement of scientific feeding knowledge as any other known factor, according to H. C. Schaefer of Purina Mills' Research Department.

"A cage full of white rats," says Schaefer, "is a better guide to determining the quality and feeding value of chick feed ingredients than a room full of chemists no matter how well



informed they may be. We have always known that the nutritive qualities of vitamins cannot be accurately revealed by tests in the chemical laboratory. Now we know also that such testing cannot or itself tell much about the feeding value of proteins, either.

In support of this statement Schaefer describes two samples of meat scrap. "Both of these were purchased from the same manufacturer," he explains. "Chemical analysis showed no difference. Sample No. 1 analyzed 55.07% protein and the other sample varied less than 1% from that amount. Both samples looked alike, smelled alike, and cost the same.
