WOLF MTN., May 16—Plans are being perfected for dedication of the magnificent Wolf Mountain Methodist church here on June 10, at which time several outstanding leaders of the Methodist Episcopal church South, are expected to be in attendance.

Membership of the church was organized less than a year ago and the Rev. Robert M. Hardee chosen as pastor.

The church is located in a section of rare scenic beauty and was erected by the Duke Foundation at an approximate cost of \$4,000 and is now under the supervision of the board of education and the board of missions of the Western North Carolina conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South. Erection of the building, which is of native stone, began in 1931. Both the land and labor of the new church were donated by the people of the Wolf Mountain section.

All are requested to bring with them well filled lunch baskets and tools to work with.

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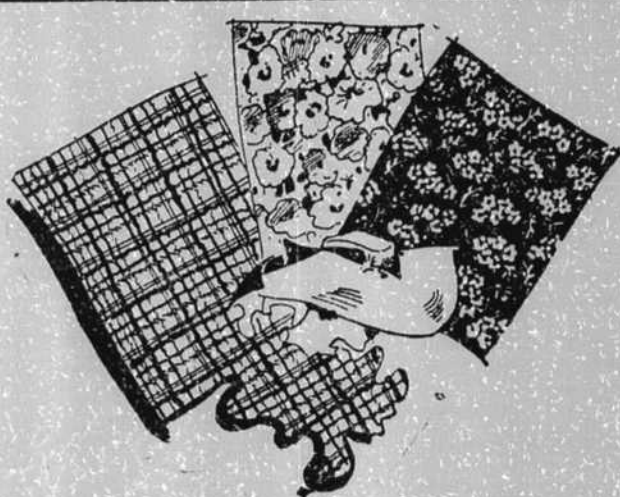
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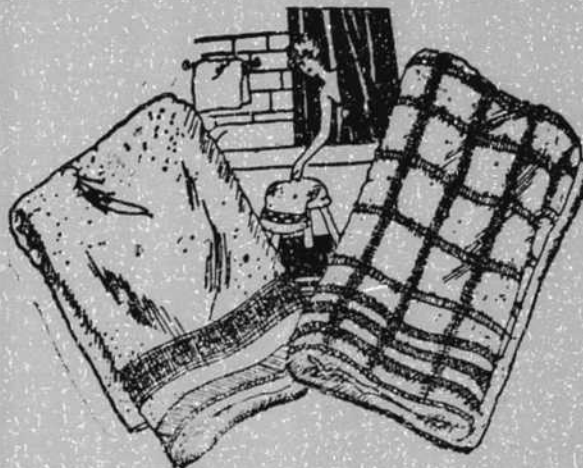


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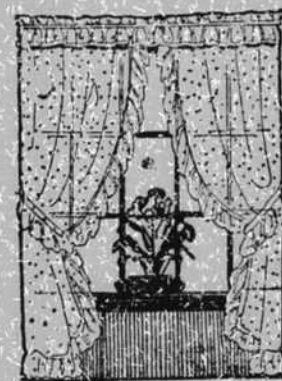
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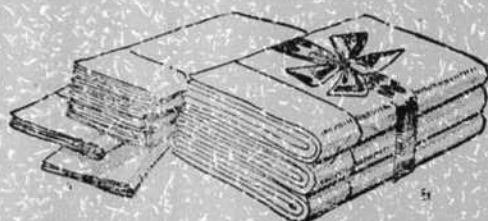
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
