RECIPE GIVEN FOR PRIZE AWARD CAKE

For the benefit of the many ladies who have expressed a desire to try the endorsed recipe of Mrs. N. B. Thomas for her White Cake DeLux, which was awarded a certificate of recipe endorsement by the Better Homes and Gardens, the recipe is reprinted below. It is pointed out by Mrs. Thomas that an error was made in the original printing of her recipe on the part of the magazine, and the correct recipe is herewith given:

WHITE CAKE DE LUX
Into a mixing bowl place 1 cupful of sugar and 1 1/2 cupfuls of flour which has been sifted with 2 teaspoonfuls of baking powder and 1/4 teaspoonful of salt. Break 2 egg whites into a 1-cup measure. Add melted butter to equal 1/2 cupful and then fill the cup with milk. Add 1 teaspoonful of flavoring (I like almond) and pour into the dry ingredients. Beat with a rotary beater until very smooth (about 5 minutes). Place in a greased pan and bake in a moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees). Cool and ice as desired. Chocolate powdered sugar butter icing is good on this cake.
