
Bugis Glen To Open

Infected chicks are weak, listless, and droopy. The appetite is gone and they huddle in groups as though they are cold. There is usually a whitish, watery dropping which has a tendency to paste up the fluff around the tail. Infected chicks soon die.

Chicks should not be allowed to eat the parasite's eggs, says Gauger. Infected chicks should be removed immediately from the flock and killed and either burned or buried deeply. The litter and sand in the brooder houses should be changed every other day or oftener. Only fresh, clean material should be used

for litter.
While the chicks are in the brooder house the runways should be prepared by spading or plowing the soil so as to turn the infected top soil under.
If this is impracticable, the chicks should be restricted to a limited area, which can be covered with sand or gravel, or they should be confined to an outdoor, wire-floor sun porch until 10 or 12 weeks old.


