The meeting was very enthusiastic and portends a hard-working, enthusiastic and united organization for the coming campaign. The people of the county were invited and urged to examine the records of the Democratic office holders for the last two years and to see that the taxes had been reduced over sixty per cent below the previous Republican administration, besides paying off many thousand dollars of county's indebtedness.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously adopted a vote of thanks and appreciation was given to W. E. Breese, chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee for the past two years, for his able and efficient work in the last campaign and a vote of confidence was given him.

This was one of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings of the executive committee that the county ever held.
